## "ATOMS FOR PEACE"



"Big three" in the field of atomic science meet in Copenhagen Airport: Professor Niels Bohr, Professor Hideki Yukawa, Mrs. Yukawa and Professor J. Robert Oppenheimer.

A meeting between three of the world's leading atom scientists took place in Copenhagen Airport. Professor J. Robert Oppenheimer of Princeton was a guest in the home of Danish Professor Niels Bohr prior to the International High Energy Congress in Geneva. Booked out of Copenhagen on the same flight to Switzerland as Oppenheimer was Hideki Yukawa,

Professor of the University of Kyoto and the only Japanese ever to win the Nobel Prize. He had arrived in Copenhagen a few hours earlier on the SAS North Pole flight accompanied by his wife. When the three atom professors met in the airport, it was arranged that professor and Mrs. Yukawa should return via Copenhagen and stay for some days with the Bohrs.

## A rose for remembrance

In the early hours of the morning of Monday June 30th a red rose was dropped over the North Pole in commemoration of those who lost their lives when the Italian dirigible "Italia" crashed in this area 30 years ago.

The rose-dropping ceremony was performed by SAS pilot Kaare Herford, captain of the Copenhagen to Tokyo flight to pass over the Pole on the "Italia" anniversary. Simultaneously the captain reported by radio to Copenhagen Airport,

and his message was included in the commemoration programme broadcast by the Italian radio "RAI" later on the same day.
